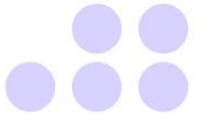

THE PROBLEM



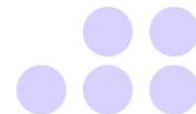
Impact of covid-19

Education has changed drastically due to the pandemic. The way students receive education, the tools they are using, and the entire landscape has evolved.



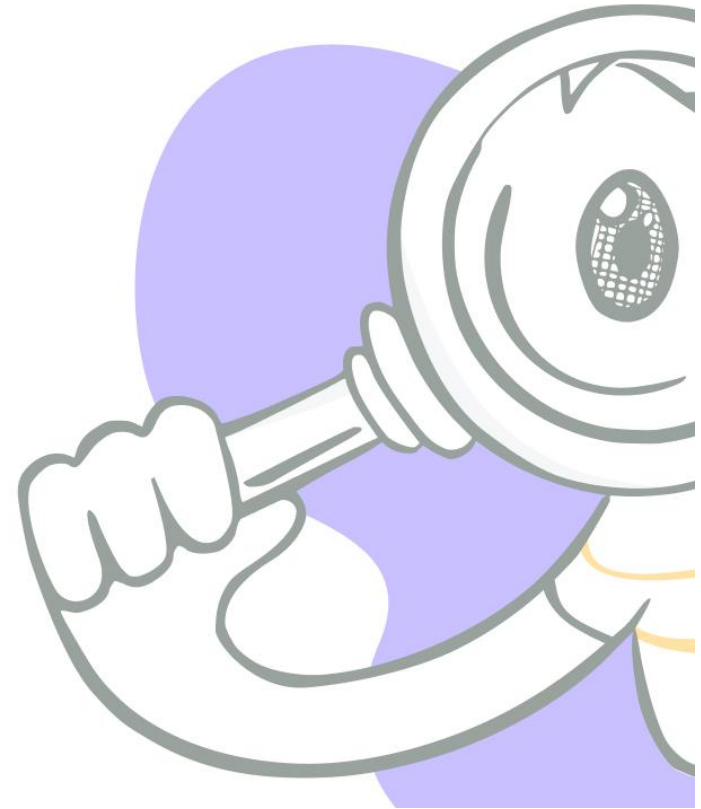
Fear of change

One of the biggest changes is the shift to online learning. While it's been around for a couple years now, only recently have entire programs and degrees shifted to being available in hybrid format.

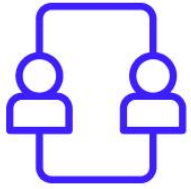


OUR AIM

THE HYPOTHESIS



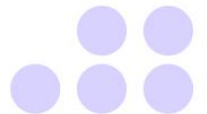
Prior to the research we realized **relationships would be an important aspect** in our study

THE OUTCOME

In Person

Pros

- Easier to make friends
- Easier to network
- Can get point across faster
- Activities encourages meeting new people
- Sense of community
- Deeper understanding of material

Cons

- Leads to a super packed schedule
- Not much free time

Pros

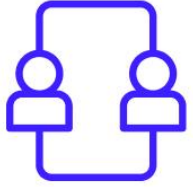
- Flexible schedule
- Easier to work part-time
- Meetings are easier to schedule

Cons

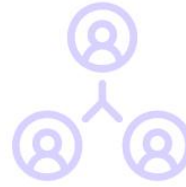
- Difficult forming friendships
- Difficult to network
- Feeling left out if you can't meet with other students
- Meetings take longer
- Screen time burn out
- Technical challenges
- Easy to get distracted
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- Harder to process and retain information



KEY FINDINGS



Relationships with other students are important



Networking should be **built into** the curriculum



Students want some **flexibility**



The **professor & student** relationship is difficult to develop remotely

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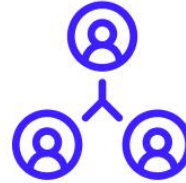


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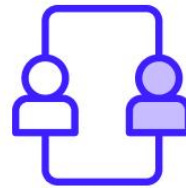
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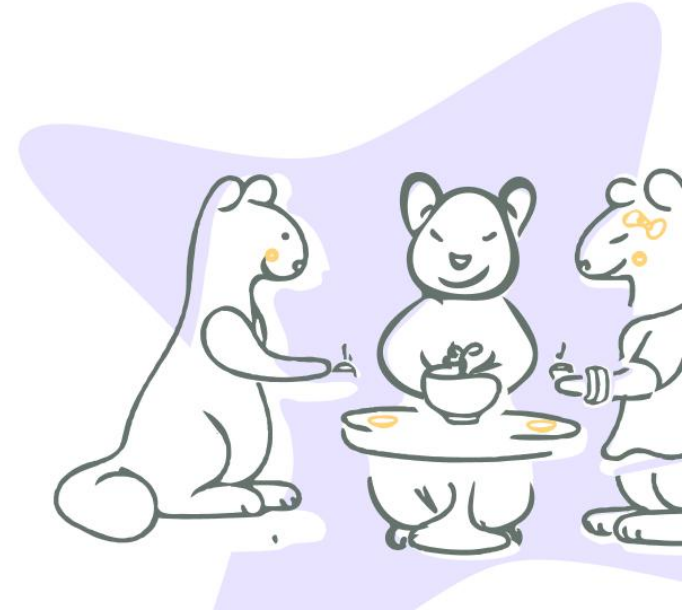


The professor & student relationship is difficult to develop remotely

SOLUTION 1

Integrate **relationship building** into the course structure

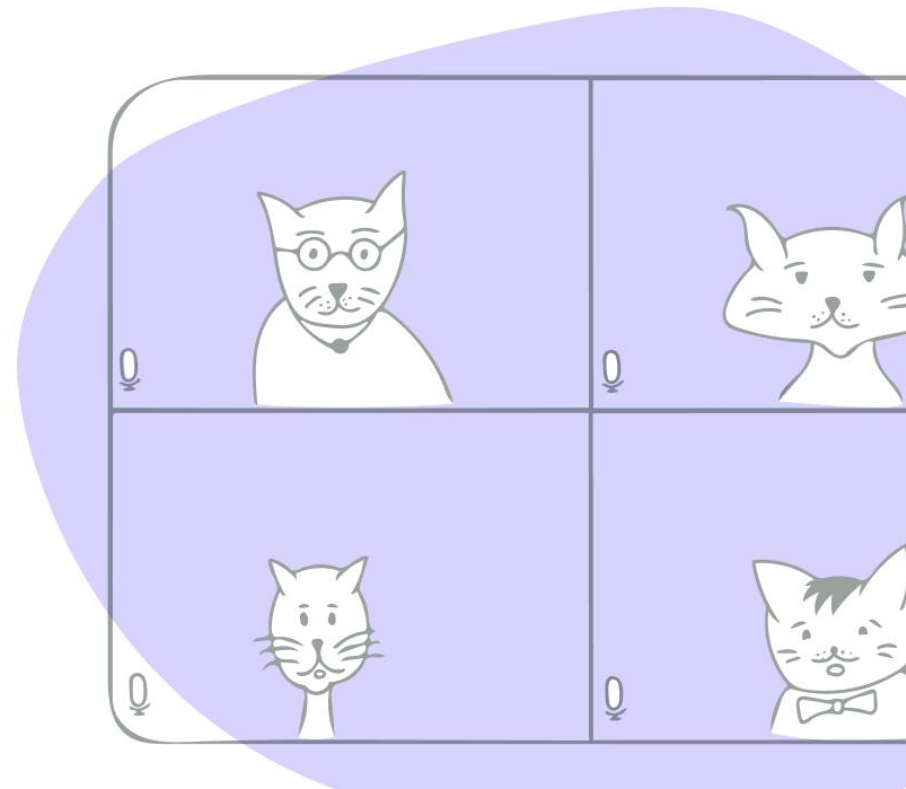
- More group projects
- Required social events for students
- A class dedicated to learning from others



SOLUTION 2

Retain remote learning, but **most classes** should be **in-person**

- Majority of courses should be in person with 1 or 2 remote courses to allow students flexibility in their schedule
- Fewer “video on” requirements to reduce zoom fatigue



SOLUTION 3

Networking as a part of the curriculum

- Each class has at least one visiting guest lecturer that can influence and connect with students
- Job fairs are only in person and more frequent
- Students encouraged to meet/collaborate with those in other departments



SOLUTION 4

Develop and maintain **teacher and student** relationships

- Required ongoing 1:1s with professor
- Proactively make sure students are on track and progressing well
